Charter Element	Charter Agreement Information
Business Objective	The primary objective of the Business & Economic Development (BED) Committee is to meet the workforce needs of high-demand sectors of the local and regional economies.
Case for Action	 As we advance our work toward realizing our vision for creating shared opportunity and economic prosperity, a number of key factors drive our work: Good jobs in today's economy and labor market require workers to have a growing level of knowledge and skill in order to compete for them; The employment gap is widening between those with higher levels of education and credentials and those who lack them; Jobs are growing at both the high-skill and low-skill end of the labor market, while growth of "middle skill" jobs has been lagging; however, the retirement of baby boomers from the labor force will create openings in nearly every industry and occupation; The incoming workforce does not have the education and skill-sets needed to perform many of these jobs, as manifested by a continued lag in the educational attainment levels of young people (although beginning to show some signs of improvement, student preparedness for post-secondary education remains very low); and The difference between supply and demand indicates that there is a "skills gap" between what most workers have to offer and what businesses need, creating the urgency to develop and support new strategies that can better equip and train people for jobs in today's economy.
Requirements	 The BED Committee will: Analyze and understand trends in order to respond to business needs Bring industry and education together to address workforce needs in priority sectors Collaborate with industry and education partners to develop solutions for workers to acquire essential skills in high-growth, high-demand sectors Work with WDB partners to develop an array of innovative workforce services supports Support development and evolution of regional workforce and economic development networks to address workforce education and training priorities
Boundaries / Guidelines	The BED Committee advises and influences the direction and implementation of business services strategies as outlined the WDB 2017-2020 Strategic Plan, including playing an advisory role to the Contra Costa Small Business Development Center (SBDC).
Team Membership	The BED Committee brings together leaders from business, economic development, education, labor, community-based organizations, and the public sector. The BED Committee co-chairs are members of the WDB Executive Committee and all members of the BED Committee hold a seat on the Workforce Development Board. The BED Committee and the WDB work on behalf of the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors and the businesses and residents of Contra Costa County. The WDB and the BED committee often draw upon the knowledge and expertise of other individuals and organizations that are not members of the WDB and occasionally form <i>Ad Hoc</i> committees to do work.
Timing	The work of the BED Committee is aligned with the timeline of the WDB's 2017-2020 Strategic Plan.
Resources	The WDB and the BED Committee provide and/or support convening and networking functions that draw together a wide spectrum of stakeholders that contribute to the health of the local economy and prepare residents for effective participation in the workforce. These include local and regional businesses, economic development experts and organizations, public agencies, education, labor, and community-based organizations.

DISCUSSION ITEM:

D1 Input Requested on Small Business-centric Fund Design by Leslay Choy, Executive Director of San Pablo Economic Development Corporation

San Pablo Economic Development Corporation (San Pablo EDC) is vested across the county in creating economic opportunity that lifts the county as a whole from both a health and economic equity perspective. The pandemic economy has made crystal clear, more than ever, that to achieve health equity, the disproportionate impacts of which are magnified several-fold in a pandemic, we must focus on economic equity.

The past 13 months have been a deep investment in pivoting services to better support workforce and business clients and listening more intently to the barriers that exacerbate a stifled economy for them. It was sobering to learn, in confidence, how extensive the debt accumulation has been to date, and to acknowledge that even in recovery, debt continues to accrue and its significance will need to be addressed. We have partnered broadly to serve and been a willing thought partner on micro grant program design. San Pablo, like many cities, also launched and loaned out all funds for a COVID grant relief program. The bigger picture, however, is the county and how we invest in an equitable economic recovery for our small businesses.

San Pablo EDC has gathered regarding uneven access to capital, the growing debt and continued transition of temporary closures to permanent, they have a base concept for a potential county-wide funding solution; however, one size does not fit all. They would like to overview the fund concept and gather input on different pain points and equity issues, to better inform the ultimate design.

RE: Report out from Accelerating an Equitable Recovery in the Bay Area/ Equitable

Economic Recovery Taskforce - Kristin Connelly & Patience Ofodu

The Business & Economic Development Committee members received a presentation on October 7, 2020, on the Contra Costa Economic Partnership-Equitable Economic Recovery Taskforce (EERTF) sponsored by EHSD-WDBCCC on how the members can align and better support the Taskforce. This presentation aligns with the work of the task force and related work in the Bay Area. Kristin Connelly, CEO and Executive Director of East Bay Leadership Council, and Patience Ofodu Interim Executive Director WDBCCC, represented Contra Costa County at the Accelerating an Equitable Recovery in the Bay Area Summit. It was a regional convening of the key leaders involved in the various economic recovery efforts that started to form a year ago at the start of the pandemic. Three of these efforts were led by mayors - San Jose, Oakland, and San Francisco. Representing these efforts at the convening were the three mayors, Sam Liccardo, Libby Schaaf, and London Breed. Kristin had two conversations with the lead staffer from the San Francisco Foundation about their work with EERTF to share our approach and our progress, which it turns out is very consistent with these other efforts. Kristin and Patience will share some highlights of what was presented at the meeting, including excerpts from three presentations (1) From Policy link's equitable atlas on the status of economic impacts of COVID; (2) shared priorities from the economic recovery efforts and (3) information from some polling by EMC research on public opinion about all relevant issues. We will discuss Contra Costa's related efforts. The complete reports are available on the task force's website.
