Workforce Development Board (WDB) of Contra Costa County Youth Committee Charter

Charter Element	Charter Agreement Information
Business Objective	The primary objective of the WDB Youth Committee is to Increase the number of youth and young adults, 16-24, who are well prepared for postsecondary vocational training, further education, and/or a career, with an emphasis on serving the most vulnerable and underserved populations and those from low-income communities.
Case for Action	 It is the vision of the WDBCCC to support a network that creates and promotes dynamic education systems, high-performing businesses, and a prosperous local economy with an abundance of high quality jobs and skilled workers to fill them. Our mission is to promote a workforce development system that meets the needs of businesses, job seekers, and workers, to support a strong and vibrant economy in Contra Costa County. As we advance our work toward realizing our vision a number of key factors drive our work: Good jobs in today's economy and labor market require workers to have a growing level of knowledge and skill in order to compete for them; The employment gap is widening between those with higher levels of education and credentials and those who lack them; Jobs are growing at both the high-skill and low-skill end of the labor market, while growth of "middle skill" jobs has been lagging; however, the retirement of baby boomers from the labor force will create openings in nearly every industry and occupation; The emerging workforce does not have the education and skill-sets needed to perform many of these jobs, as manifested by a continued lag in the educational attainment levels of young people (although beginning to show some signs of improvement, student preparedness for post-secondary education remains very low); and The difference between supply and demand indicates that there is a "skills gap" between what most emerging workers have to offer and what businesses need, creating the urgency to develop and support new strategies that can better equip and train people for jobs in today's economy.
Requirements	 The WDB Youth Committee will: Work with partners to develop systems that effectively engage employers in career development and work-based learning opportunities for youth and young adults to learn about, explore, and prepare for careers; Strengthen collaborations between the local workforce system and other programs and systems that seek to help youth with significant barriers to employment; Develop and implement strategies to direct Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) and other resources to serve youth and young adults most in need and support their success; Collaborate with and support career-focused strategies at high schools and community colleges, particularly those aligned with WDB priority industry sectors; Work with partners to increase opportunities for high school graduates, dropouts and disconnected youth to transition into postsecondary education, training and careers; and Work with Community Colleges, Apprenticeship Programs, Trade Schools and others to offer more opportunities for disconnected youth to achieve success.
Boundaries / Guidelines	The Youth Committee advises and influences the direction and implementation of youth services strategies as outlined the WDB 2013-2017 Strategic Plan.
Team Membership	The Youth Committee brings together leaders from business, economic development, education, labor, community-based organizations, youth/young adults and the public sector. The Youth Committee chair(s) is a member of the WDB Executive Committee and some members of the Youth Committee hold a seat on the Workforce Development Board. Other Youth Committee members are recruited and engaged to represent a particular perspective or constituency. The Youth Committee and the WDB work on behalf of the Contra Costa County Board of Supervisors and the businesses and residents of Contra Costa County. The WDB and the Youth Committee also draw upon the knowledge and expertise of other individuals and organizations that are not members of the WDB and occasionally form Ad Hoc committees to conduct specific activities.
Timing	The work of the Youth Committee is aligned with the timeline for the WDB's Strategic Plan.
Resources	The WDB and the Youth Committee provide and/or support convening and networking functions that draw together a wide spectrum of stakeholders that contribute to the health of the local economy and prepare residents for effective participation in the workforce. These include local and regional businesses, economic development experts and organizations, public agencies, education, labor, and community-based organizations.
Review Process	The Youth Committee monitors and reports its progress at regular committee meetings, the WDB Executive Committee and full WDB member meetings as appropriate. Progress against the WDB Strategic Plan is reviewed at regular intervals as determined by the WDB and any of its relevant governing authorities at the local, state, and/or federal level

Learning Aligned Employment Program (LAEP) Overview

- Paid, career-related internship for eligible underrepresented students to enhance their technical and essential skills, benefiting both students and employer
- LAEP college include: CA Community College (CCC), CA State University (CSU), University of CA (UC)
- \$500 Million in state funds were allocated to LAEP

Skill Building for Learners

Students engage in meaningful work experience and become trained, competitive workers. Employers work with a subsidized employee who learns and grows within the company/organization, with the support of a local college instructor.

Employers Partnerships

Structured LAEP partnerships create mutually beneficial relationships that bolster students' economic mobility and create a local, qualified talent pipeline for employers.

Student Eligibility

- Underrepresented backgrounds
- At least half-time enrollment
- CA resident classification
- Maintenance of satisfactory academic progress
- Demonstrated financial need
- Eligibility to work in the U.S.

Employer Eligibility

- Research centers and institutions operated by (UC, CSU, CCC) if the position provides students with direct opportunities to participate in research.
- *Public schools* operated by school districts, county superintendents of schools, the Department of the Youth Authority, or the Department of Education.
- Nonsectarian, nonpolitical organizations or corporations, if they can provide students with fulltime employment opportunities within their areas of study after graduation. Alternatively, if they can provide transferable skills in the internship that can lead to employment.
- Employers will sign an Employer Agreement.
- A student will be placed in an educationally beneficial position related to their area of study, or career objectives.
- The student will be paid at a comparable rate to existing positions in the field.
- The LEAP program cannot displace workers or impair existing contracts for services.

LAEP Funding by Employer

LAEP funds may provide:

- Up to 50% of compensation for positions at for profit employers
- Up to 0% of the student's compensation for positions at public educational institutions or nonprofit corporations.
- Up to 100% of compensation for positions at the UC, CSU, or CA Community College (CCC)

Overview of Potential LAEP subsidy:

Up 90% of the student's compensation for positions at nonprofit corporations Up to 50% of compensation for positions at profit employers



RE: Youth Centers Community Engagement

A. BACKGROUND

The Contra Costa County (CCC) Board of Supervisors, in alignment with the objectives of Measure X, has designated funds for the establishment of three new youth centers. These centers aim to address the diverse needs of youth residing in different districts of the county. The allocation of these centers is as follows:

- BOS District 3: East County, encompassing unincorporated areas such as Bethel Island, Byron, Discovery Bay, Knightsen, and the municipalities of Antioch, Brentwood, and Oakley.
- BOS District 4: Central County, comprising Concord, Clayton, Pleasant Hill, Walnut Creek, as well
 as unincorporated areas like Contra Costa Centre and Morgan Territory.
- BOS District 5: East County (Eastern part of D5), including Pittsburg, a section of Antioch, and surrounding unincorporated regions such as Bay Point.

The planning process for these youth centers is under the leadership of the Employment and Human Services Department (EHSD), with oversight from the Workforce Development Board (WDB). Social Change Partners and Public Minded Consulting have been engaged as consultants to support this endeavor.

B. CURRENT SITUATION

Community engagement has been a crucial aspect, involving an online survey and listening sessions conducted from October 2023 through April 2024. The scope of engagement covers a wide range of aspects including youth needs, service priorities, program offerings, location considerations, operating hours, priority populations, age demographics, and diverse experiences. Specific targets have been set to ensure comprehensive engagement, including a minimum of 300 survey responses (100 per district), with at least half of the respondents in each district being youth age 25 or under. Additionally, 30-40 live and virtual community input sessions are planned, with a minimum attendance of 50 individuals per district, ensuring representation from youth demographics. The feedback garnered from these engagements will inform the drafting of Implementation Plans for each center, which will subsequently be presented to the Board of Supervisors for approval. Following approval, a competitive procurement process will be initiated to select the provider(s) tasked with operating each center.

The drafting of a Community Engagement Report summarizing the findings is currently underway.

C. NEXT STEPS

Now through July 1, 2024, we will be focusing our efforts as follows:

- Ad Hoc Workgroup provides feedback on the draft Youth Centers Community Engagement Report
- Final Community engagement report to be sent to WDBCCC and WDB Youth Committee as Informational item
- Ad Hoc Workgroup provides feedback on draft Youth Centers Implementation Plan
- Special meeting of WDB Youth Committee to approve Youth Centers Implementation Plan
- Special meeting of WDBCCC Full Board to approve Youth Centers Implementation plan

It should be noted that this date is tentative and subject to change based on various factors, primarily site identification.

This project plan outlines a comprehensive approach to establishing youth centers in Contra Costa County, aiming to address the diverse needs and priorities of the youth population across different districts.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Youth Committee approve an Ad-Hoc committee, utilizing members of the already established Measure X Youth Center Steering Committee, to review, provide feedback, make recommendations to said committee on the work products from the community engagement process to help shape the development of the Measure X Youth Centers.

A. BACKGROUND

The contractor Social Change Partners, (SCP) began the community engagement process in October 2023. Over the last six months, SCP has worked diligently to gather community input to guide priorities for the Measure X Youth Centers. This undertaking included the seating of a Steering Committee of diverse stakeholders with relevant expertise to support and inform the process. In addition, Public Minded Consulting group was brought on to accelerate the community engagement process and ensure the SCP goals aligned with the district specific requests. Public Minded Consulting played an integral role alongside Social Change Partners in overseeing the community engagement phase of this project.

B. CURRENT SITUATION

This item brings forward the transition of the Measure X Youth Centers Steering Committee from Social Change Partners to an Ad-hoc working group within the WDB Youth Committee, following the conclusion of the community engagement phase. This Ad-hoc group will review, provide feedback on, make recommendations to the Youth Committee on the work products from the community engagement process.

The Ad-Hoc Committee anticipates convening two to three meetings between now and the next Youth Committee Meeting on August 26, 2024. During these sessions, the committee aims to complete the following tasks:

- Provide comprehensive feedback on the draft Youth Centers Community Engagement Report
- Provide Feedback on the draft Youth Centers Implementation Plan

(Please note that the timeline provided above is subject to change based on evolving project needs and requirements)

As a result, the Youth Committee will make final recommendations to the Full Board and BOS on the draft Youth Center implementation plans, thereby continuing support and guidance in the shaping and development of the Measure X Youth Centers. This work supports multiple elements with the WDB's Local

Plan. WDB recognizes the significant barriers that youth experience in connecting to services, career pathways, and eventual entry and advancement in gainful employment. This work aims to identify gaps in existing services and determine how the youth centers can address those needs effectively. As a result, opportunities to leverage the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) Youth Programs may be identified.

WDB prepares to use these elements to help inform current and future strategies for enhancing the youth services in the Local Areas, specifically addressing the community needs of District 3, 4, and 5.

RE: Recommendation to Release Request For Proposal (RFP) for WIOA Youth Services

RECOMMENDATION

That the Youth Committee approve the release of an RFP for WIOA Youth Services with a release date in the Fall and forward the recommendation to the Full Workforce Development Board (WDB) for consideration.

A. BACKGROUND

The Workforce Development Board (WDB), with Board of Supervisors approval, has recently moved to a four-year procurement cycle.

After successfully prevailing in their bids the current youth service providers were awarded contracts in July 2021 in response to RFP #1174. WIOA requirements regarding competitive procurement necessitate the release of a new RFP for WIOA Youth Services on a 4-year procurement term.

Past RFP development through the WDB has involved the process of:

- 1) Outreach with community stakeholders to identify possible geographic needs and service trends,
- 2) Convening focused conversations with current service providers to discuss current program trends and identify gaps in current program design and
- 3) Identifying WDB and Youth Committee members to work with staff on the program design component of the RFP process.

B. CURRENT SITUATION

Contracts with the youth service providers, Contra Costa County Office of Education and Mount Diablo Unified School District are in the process of being renewed for the PY 24-25 Program year, the final year of the 4-year procurement cycle.

Because the time needed to release an RFP, evaluate proposals, select providers, and negotiate and execute contracts can easily exceed a year, WDB Youth Program Staff have started the planning process and created a draft RFP timeline.

C. FISCAL IMPACT

Exact funds available in this RFP will not be known until the State of California releases program year 2024-2025 allocations. Based on PY 23-24 Youth allocation amounts minus projected WDB staff and operating costs, an estimated \$1,100,000 - \$1,300,000 may be available for the provision of WIOA Youth Services.

RECOMMENDATION

That the Youth Committee approve:

- 1. The creation of (5) youth seats on the WDB Youth Committee/Measure X Youth Center Sub-Committee.
- 2. Recruitment of youth from a broad pool of candidates (not limited specifically to WIOA).
- 3. Provide Compensation to youth members paid with Measure X funds.
- 4. Forward this recommendation to the Board of Supervisors for approval to use Measure X funds.

A. BACKGROUND

The Youth Committee has had several discussions regarding effective ways to ensure youth voice in decision-making. Staff have toured the Ryse Center in Richmond where there was youth involvement and decision-making in every aspect of its creation and development. Additional suggestions included focusing on the deliverable and activities that youth want and providing opportunities for youth to meet without adults taking leadership.

With the creation of Measure X Youth Centers and the quest for continuous improvement in existing Youth Programs, it is essential to that the Youth Centers prioritize:

- Youth Voice heavily weighted in decision- making
- Youth Centers benchmarks and measureable outcomes
- Reflection of youth needs in their communities
- Youth Centers accessible to diverse and vulnerable populations
- Optimal Impact for Contra Costa youth
- Promotion of equity and inclusion across diverse youth population
- Intergenerational thriving
- Comprehensive, whole-human approach
